Educational Technology Mini-Grant Opportunity

This winter ICSOS is offering Inyo County's TK-12 classroom teachers grants of up to \$2000 per teacher to fund technology that supports teaching and learning. Minigrants will be available to individual teachers only, rather than teacher teams.

To apply, teachers must submit a simple grant application via Google Docs/Drive. In accepting funding, grantees agree to submit a brief report at the end of the school year.

Writing Contest Results

L he 5th Inyo County Writing Contest for middle school "When you are in Inyo County you can have a feeling of security in your schools and at home." - Mark McAlister, Owens Valley School

students was held in October. Participating students from five different school districts were charged with writing an article about living in Inyo County. Students were asked to imagine that, as a local business owner or director of a large organization, they would need to attract potential employees to Inyo County. Students accessed an ICSOS-generated website that housed resources the students could use in researching their piece: an article entitled "10 Ways Growing Up In A Small

Town Prepared You For Life," links to several websites, and a video interview with Tawni Thomson, executive director of the Bishop Area Chamber of Commerce. In the articles, students highlighted the proximity of Inyo County to National Parks, the area's rich cultural heritage, and the vast variety of recreational opportunities. Many of the students echoed the thoughts of Kylee Jorgensen when she said:

" [Inyo County] can surely

be a place you can call home. With its small schools and community you are certain to develop long lasting friendships..."

Tech Corner: Apps for Students

Here are three apps you and your students might find useful:

1. Google Keep: Easy sticky notes and to-do lists follow you anywhere

Google's personal organizer lets you create sticky notes and todo lists that can be shared with others by entering names or email addresses. Students can share notes with each other and teachers can share notes with students. Users can organize their notes with labels to group them together. Add a reminder

to a Google Keep note to call your attention to a note at a certain time.

2. Make slideshows interactive with Nearpodize this!

This Chrome extension turns your Google slides into an interactive presentation, just like the app Nearpod. The teacher controls how quickly to advance through slides as students follow along on their devices. Nearpod provides interactive elements such as quizzes and

polls that allow students to respond and interact with the presentation on their own devices, as the teacher views their responses.

3. Hemingway App: Help students improve the mechanics of their writing with the free Hemingway Editor app. Students copy and paste their text into the app, which analyzes their writing for wordy sentences, passive voice, and unnecessarily long words. The app highlights questionable sentences and words, and shows the grade level of the writing.

Read With Me PROMOTING LITERACY IN THE OWENS VALLEY

LCSOS and Altrusa of the Eastern Sierra have partnered to bring a volunteer-based literacy program to Inyo County. Read With Me is designed to: share the joy of reading; foster lifelong readers; support literacy development; and expand students' home library.

Currently, there are over 20 volunteers serving 25 students with more volunteers ready to be Those interested in placed. volunteering attend a brief orientation and then are scheduled to read aloud, one-on-one with students in 20 - 30 minute sessions. The time volunteers spend with students is much like reading a bedtime story to a child: relaxed, informal and fun! Twice per month students choose a book to take home. Participating students are excited to read with their buddies and enjoy choosing books to take home.

Many of our adult volunteers report that they enjoy the reading sessions as much as-if not more than-the children! Diane Doonan of Range & River books eloquently describes some of the many advantages of volunteering and the effect on students: "...the best way to feel optimistic about the future is to get to know some wonderful children, especially if you know they can face the world with strong reading skills."
