Although a main focus for the conference is on using technology for teaching and learning, there will also be sessions devoted to nontechnology-based topics. This year your colleagues will be part of the presentation team; if there is a technology-related topic that you would like to present, please let us know! New Curriculum Frameworks are here!

California will be releasing two new Curriculum Frameworks this fall: the History/Social Science Framework adopted in July, and the Science Framework which is based on the Next Generation Science Standards and will be approved by the State Board of Education this fall. Standards are often referred to as the "what" students should know and be able to do, and the Curriculum Framework is the document that provides the "how".

While much of the H/SS Framework will be familiar to teachers since the standardsbased content hasn't changed, there are also many new features. First and foremost, the Framework integrates the Common Core Standards for Literacy and the new English Language Development standards. In the chapters for each grade level, teachers will find examples and strategies for the integration of content and literacy instruction. There is also

a new focus on inquiry and critical thinking in this revision. According to California History Social Science Project Director Nancy McTygue in her blog post, "Each grade level chapter is organized around large questions of significance, supplemented with questions to organize instruction around more discrete eras, movement, or periods."

The new Science Framework, based on standards that differ substantially in format and organization from the old Science Standards, is quite different from the old Framework. The new document describes the three dimensions of learning from the NGSS (Science and Engineering Practices, Disciplinary Core Ideas, and Crosscutting Concepts) and shows how the dimensions interrelate in the context of science content. Like the new Mathematics Framework, the Science

Framework incorporates many examples of how teachers can address the new Practices. And like the History Framework, the Science Framework addresses the CCSS, including opportunities for ELA/ELD connections as well as opportunities for Mathematics connections. Each grade level features vignettes that describe what we might see and hear in a Science classroom. The Science Framework provides useful guidance for teachers as they begin transitioning to the NGSS.

Spread the word! ICSOS is now offering free classes for adults who want to brush up on math or reading skills, or learn life skills such as resumé writing, preparing for interviews, and budgeting.
