California School Dashboard

California is launching a new website this month designed to help communities access information about K-12 districts and schools. Called the California School Dashboard (https:// www.caschooldashboard.org/), the site features reports on multiple measures of school success. As part of California's emerging accountability system, the Dashboard is a tool that supports districts and schools in identifying strengths, areas for improvement and performance gaps. It is also intended help districts align resources to student outcomes through Local Control and Accountability Plans (LCAPs). It is the next step in a series of major shifts in English Learner Progress, Grad-California's public education system that have raised the bar for student learning, transformed testing, and placed a focus on equity for all students. In the past, accountability systems for schools and districts relied solely on test scores', but one test taken on one particular day doesn't provide a complete picture of all the ways schools are helping students succeed. The Dashboard's multiple indicators give a fuller and more transparent picture of a school's progress. The Dashboard's reports, based on growth, show a school's trajectory over time and provide data for a continuous improvement process. In addition, this tool makes it easier to identify and focus on addressing disparities among stu-

English Learner Progress will be measured using a formula that includes the reclassification rate and number of students who have increased one level as measured by the CELDT. The English Language Art and Mathematics indicators are determined by Smarter Balanced (SBAC) scores for students in

grades 3-8 who are continuously enrolled from the fall count date through the testing period and have been enrolled in school for at least one year.

Poetry Out Loud Results

Owens Valley High School, received the title of 2017 Invo County Poetry Out Loud Champion at the county finals held in Bishop on February 9. The runner-up was Ashley Miller, from Palisades-Glacier High School. This was the seventh year that Invo Council for the Arts has partnered with ICSOS to offer Poetry Out Loud, which is sponsored by the California Arts Council, the National Endowment for the Arts, and The Poetry Foundation. Retired English teacher Harold McDonald served as the county coordinator. Teachers Barbara Fernandez (BUHS), Jessica Libbee (OVHS), Rose Sabo (PGHS), and Jason Lozier

(LPHS) held Poetry Out Loud classroom contests. The contestants at the county finals are the winners from those classes. Over 50 students participated this year.

At the county finals, contestants recited works they selected from an anthology of more than 900 classic and contemporary poems. Poetry Out Loud gives students an opportunity to master public speaking skills, build self-confidence, and learn about their literary heritage. Grace's recitations of "Cartoon



Physics, Part 1" by Nick Flynn and "Annabel Lee" by Edgar Allan Poe, moved the guest judges, who evaluated student performances on criteria including presence, evidence of understanding, and accuracy.

Morisset moves on to compete in Sacramento March 12th and 13th, representing Inyo County in the California State Championship. The California State Champion will compete for the national title in Washington, D.C. in April. Good luck Grace!
